



Communicable Disease

Communicable disease control accounts for a large portion of the health department's work.

By state statute, certain diseases must be reported to local health departments. These diseases pose a public health concern because of their severity and/or their potential for spread. The Langlade County Health Department (LCHD) receives and investigates these and other communicable diseases.





Alcohol and Other Drug Use

As Alcohol and Other Drug Use continues to be a priority for our community, programs continued in 2023. LCHD utilized public education and prevention campaigns to emphasize the dangers of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs.

74% of community surveys in 2022 indicated substance use as a "major issue."

Healthy Living and Active Lifestyles

Healthy Living Active Lifestyles was one of the three priority areas identified in the 2023-2025 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). This was a new priority that had not had previous work done. The Langlade County Health Department implemented 3 new programs and provided nutrition information at 2 health fairs in 2023.

Education Efforts

Education was provided at the local farmer's market in Antigo once a month from June-September on healthy eating and nutrition.

FRESH

The "Fresh Flavors" program provides recipe cards and food safety information on a highlighted fruit and vegetable monthly. 4 stores agreed to participate including: Lafaro's Fresh Market, Lakeside Market, Pick N Save, and the North Trail Store in Elcho.

Environmental Health Programs & Services

The LCHD expanded its Environmental Health Program in 2023 and is now an Agent for the State of WI DATCP in licensing food and recreational establishments while also following up on complaints. LCHD also serves as an Agent for the WI DNR in ensuring safe water at private wells that serve the public (bars, restaurants, churches. etc).


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

A final report with all of the radon results mapped out by zip code that was sent to all participants who received a free test kit. In 2023, the Langlade County Health Department (LCHD) completed the work for a \$10,000 radon grant awarded by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. 200 short term tests were provided to Langlade County residents. Each participant with an elevated level of radon was contacted and provided with recommendations per EPA guidelines.


Licensing & Inspections

The Langlade County Health Department became an agent for the WI Department of Agriculture, Trade & Consumer Protection in July 2023. LCHD is responsible for the licensing and regulation of retail food establishments, campground, swimming pools, water attractions, hotels, motels and tourist rooming houses. LCHD ensures that all establishments are following state and local regulations. All licensed establishments that serve the public are inspected by the Langlade County Health Department annually by the Environmental Health Specialist.




Flu vaccines to children in all schools of Langlade County

The immunization program provides immunizations to eligible children and adults striving to reduce or eliminate vaccine preventable diseases. This was a cost savings of **\$24,018.85** thru the Vaccines for Children and Vaccines for Adults program, which adults and children who are uninsured or under insured are eligible for free vaccinations. COVID and Flu vaccinations were also included.


LCHD's goal is 72%.

To increase parental awareness related to vaccine schedules, LCHD used a reminder letter to all parents. Public Health Nurses also promote vaccine awareness, education and access to care. LCHD outreaches to local providers to share current immunization rates and encourage vaccination.

Assessment & Surveillance



The Langlade County Health Department's continuous surveillance of communicable disease has guided community outreach efforts, public health interventions and sharing with local health care providers.

Throughout 2023, the Langlade County Health Department continued to assess communicable diseases in our communities. In addition to COVID-19, LCHD monitored other communicable diseases including the spread of influenza, RSV and Mpox.

Information is shared with local health care providers in the "Communicable Disease Newsletter" which goes out quarterly to provide updates, trends and relative information.





The Langlade County Health Department provides leadership for population health improvement.

In 2022, the Community Health Needs Assessment identified 3 top priorities to be addressed in the Community Health Improvement Plan. This plan is a long-term effort to address public health issues in a community. The priority areas are: (1) Mental Well-being, (2) Alcohol and Other Drug Use, and (3) Healthy Living & Active Lifestyles. As 2023 began the implementation phase, the Health Department and partners continue to provide programs, services and will work on systematic planning to achieve the vision of: Langlade County: thriving people, healthy communities, and safe environments.


Community Partnership Development



The Langlade County Health Department continues to facilitate partnerships to address public health priorities.

Community Partnership Highlights

- School Partnerships- Partnered with All Saints Catholic School, Elcho School District, and Antigo School District to provide "In Plain Sight" Learning Sessions. Continued partnerships to bring back the "Teen Health Fair" for students. Partnered with Peace Lutheran School to discuss healthy habits with 6-8 graders.
- Senior Center of Langlade County- Continued partnership to provide educational sessions as well as a "Senior Health Fair" to those attending the Senior Center of Langlade County.
- Grocery stores-Established partnerships with local grocery stores during the implementation of "Fresh Flavors" program.
- Community Service- In order to build relationships and provide service to our community and residents staff completed community service hours.
- Community Flu Clinics- Partnered with Senior Center of Langlade County, CoVantage Credit Union, Antigo Unified School District, Brickners of Antigo, Spring Breeze Dairy Group to provide annual flu vaccines to staff.




Community Partnership Development

Building a Healthier Langlade County



LCHD continues to facilitate the Building a Healthier Langlade County Coalition, a community-centered approach to address public health priorities identified by Langlade County residents and identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment.

Alliance for Substance Use Prevention





Activities include:

"Small Talks" campaign, State Opioid Response grant that provided take away bags and locked bags to community members, partnership with Antigo Police Dept. for Drug Take Back Day in October, community meeting regarding substance use.

Mental-Well Being and Suicide Prevention

Positive mental health allows people to realize their full potential, cope with the stress of life, work productively, and make meaningful contributions to their communities

Activities include:

Hosted "S" Word: Let's Talk About Suicide event. Attended Tavern League meeting to distribute posters, can koozies; provided packets to local businesses with suicide prevention resources; volunteered at Cornhole event to raise awareness; distributed can koozies with 988 to local fair, softball tournament. Staff also provided mental health resources to local events such at Music in the Park, MS spaghetti dinner, Senior Center, and HS Teen Health Fair.



Organizational Competencies



Ensuring a competent, skilled and dynamic workforce is essential to move the LCHD's mission forward. The LCHD is committed to maintaining a skilled, knowledgeable, and passionate public health workforce.

Workforce Development Plan

The Workforce Development (WFD) Plan is driven by the Langlade County Health Department's (LCHD) Strategic Plan, which is a dynamic plan serving as a guide for decision-making and resource allocation for a period of time, and responsive to the results of Core Competency, Health Equity, Performance Management, Quality Improvement and other departmental self-assessments.

Objective 3: Langlade County Health Department will assure a work environment where employees are valued and supported.

Policy Development & Support



The Langlade County Health Department ensures quality and consistency in program delivery and practices by maintaining updated policies and procedures.

The Langlade County Board of Health serves as an advisory board for the LCHD, they are an essential part of policy development, approval and advocacy. The LCHD looks to the Board of Health to ask questions, advocate for health and services, represent constituents, develop and support policy change to improve the health of Langlade County.

Emergency Preparedness & Response



The Langlade County Health Department continues to plan, prepare and respond to public health emergencies in collaboration with partners.

The LCHD continued work in Public Health Emergency Preparedness capabilities throughout the year to build a stronger public health preparedness program. Part of the public health emergency preparedness program is ensuring exercises and trainings of all staff in order to quickly and efficiently respond to emergency events.




